

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A Labor of Love (and Tears) Is Finally Complete!

"How to Change the World One Penny at a Time: The Story of Claude Good and the Worm Project"... a book about the life of Claude Good, missionary and founder of The Worm Project, is finally available! While the writing and editing of the book took almost five years, two authors, and several editors, it is now done. The writing of this book became another story within a story. Author Dawn Ruth Nelson, daughter of Mennonite historian, pastor, and author John Ruth, began writing the book in 2016 and tragically became ill and died of ovarian cancer before finishing the

book. She continued writing even as her condition deteriorated and despite being advised to focus on her own health. With the manuscript nearly finished but with the cancer stealing most of her r emaining energy, Dawn finally turned her work over to fellow writer and close friend Beverly Benner Miller. For Bev, finishing the book was a gift she could give to her friend in her final days.

This book tells the story of Claude Good, a man who worked for many years as a missionary in a remote region of southern Mexico and later founded the Worm Project, a nonprofit organization dedicated to ridding children of parasitic worms around the world. As Phil Bergey, former Conference Coordinator of Franconia Mennonite Conference, tells in the foreword of the book, "Claude never aspired to be visible or important or well-known. He wasn't a self-centered personality who ran over everyone in front of him. Quite the opposite. He was and is someone

Vitamin Angels aims to help break the cycle of undernutrition that perpetuates health and economic inequities in communities around the world. Their unique model, working alongside local program partners, is how they effectively help remove barriers to accessing health and nutrition services.



One of Vitamin Angels' local program partners in Haiti, Fonkoze, has provided access to tools, resources, and support to Haitian communities for over 27 years. According to the seasoned organization, over 75% of Haitians lack access to health products and services, particularly those living in rural and hard-to-reach areas. To address this gap in access, they offer a multitude of services to meet individuals where they are in their journey.

Fonkoze began partnering with Vitamin Angels in 2008 to distribute albendazole to children 12-59 months of age.



Since then, the partnership has only strengthened in trust and numbers. In 2020, Fonkoze received enough albendazole to reach 66,000 children in Haitian communities. Much credit is due to their dedicated staff for their continuous, adaptive, and passionate approach to distributing albendazole throughout various rural areas.

With the support of The Worm Project, we are continuing to provide albendazole to thousands of children in Haiti and around the world. Together, as a global community, we are helping protect children from infection and illness and improving their overall health and well-being!



The Worm Project: What we do:

The Worm Project buys medicine to treat children infected with parasitic worms in the poorest countries of the world.

- Over 800 million children (roughly 1/4 of the world's children) are at risk of being infected with parasitic worms
 - Parasitic worms cause physical and cognitive impairment in children due to malnutrition
- The Worm Project purchased and distributed enough deworming medicine to treat 4.2 million children in 2020
- Each deworming tablet costs less than 3 cents and treats one child for parasitic worms
 - One tablet kills virtually all the worms living in children
 - Medicine is extremely effective and safe
- All-volunteer Christian organization is extremely cost effective
 - Expenses are extremely low
 - Donations are tax deductible
